A master plan has yet to be developed. There has been mention of the possibility of paving the trail from Ashton to Fall River. Some other interest groups dream of a full loop trail that connects to Yellowstone National Park, Grand Teton National Park and back to Victor, Driggs, and Tetonia.

Issues and Remarks

The park consists of a 29.6 mile long abandoned railroad right-of-way that has a gravel surface. The park is managed by Harriman SP. There are five bridges and restored rail trestles that will require periodic maintenance. Currently there is a 1.4 mile section that requires a detour because land owners are opposed to trail use across their properties.
