The park was opened as Bruneau Dunes State Park in 1970. The astronomy observatory was completed in 1998. The Eagle Cove Campground was added in 2001.

There are several individual picnic tables available with 2 at the visitor center, 4 at the lake day use area, and 6 at the observatory day use area. The park is adjacent to C.J. Strike Wildlife Management Area and BLM Morley Nelson Snake River Birds of Prey National Conservation Area. The Bruneau Canyon overlook is nearby. The pavement of roads and parking lots are in need of resurfacing. A segment near the lake/dunes parking lot is in poor repair.
