## Issues and Remarks

The park consists of a 73 mile, 10' wide asphalt trail. There are 36 bridges and trestles, the most prominent of which is the 300 foot Chatcolet Bridge over the lake at Heyburn State Park. There are 39 day use areas with tables and benches along the way and some of these have vault toilets. There are 19 developed trailheads on the route. The Coeur d'Alene Tribe operate the following trailheads and waysides: Gathering Place, Stopping Place, Place for Racing, Canoe Landing, A familiar Place and Steamboat Landing. Heyburn State Park operates the Plummer Point and Chatcolet trailheads. The IDPR manages the all the trailheads and waysides from Harrison to Mullan. About 49 picnic tables are provided at the various trailheads and waysides. Where tree shade is not readily available, some sites have shelters built over the picnic tables.
